NAVY DAY MODEL ROCKETRY -- A SUCCESS ?

On October 28 and 29 NAVY DAY celebrations were held at Andrews Air Force Base. As part of the program the NAR had a $\frac{1}{2}$ hour model rocket demonstration launch each day just before exibition flying of the Blue Angels.

On Saturday, October 28, 1967, we started right in time with the raising of the U. S. flag (the fifteen star—fifteen bar flag: The Star Spangled Banner.") Flying was kept on schedual and was very nice. The demonstration on Saturday was before a crowd of over 10 or 15 spectators. Poor attendance was due to a lack of communications between the base traffic directors and the NAVY DAY planning staff.


