## WIND TUNNEL REPORT

when NARHAMS merged with WARS a while back, we obtained the use of the WARS with tunnel. The wind tunnel was begun by the new defunct Whitman Aerospace Research Sety section in 1965. The wind tunnel we designed to test the drag and stability rockets and boost-gliders, and for aerospace research.

Initiated by the former WARS presided by the original design was formal tunnel costing around \$100, but things changed that. After the 3-phase power line for the motor was installed and the Student Government loan was repaid withea \$100 grant from the P.T.A, the tunnel was complete.
